This factsheet provides information on CPD in Italy and the differences compared to the UK.

## CPD in Italy

Whilst CPD originally began as an educational practice in the UK, it is now undertaken in most countries and a standard expectation of any international professional body or regulator. The CPD Standards Office works with hundreds of organisations, and has accredited thousands of activities, many of which are delivered globally.

## Within Italy slightly different language is used to describe the practice of CPD.

Continuing Medical Education (CME) is the same as continuing professional development (CPD). It is simply a different term that is focused on healthcare and medical professions and is often used by professional bodies and regulators in Europe.

Instead of a "CPD Policy" it is called a "CME Policy" where medical professionals are still required to do a number of hours to maintain their professional license



to practice. Despite different terminologies, it is important to remember that **CPD** and **CME** are the same *thing* - simply a formal approach to lifelong learning, whereby individuals record training and learning undertaken within the work place that keeps their professional qualifications up to date.

It is important to note that these terms are interchangeable and therefore so are the certificates of attendance. For example, if a doctor from the UK attends a conference in Italy and receives a CME certificate, they can still use it within their British CPD record. Similarly, if an Italian Doctor attends an accredited CPD conference, abroad - perhaps in the UK or USA, they can use this is their CPD record.



In addition, should an Italian Doctor attend a CPD accredited training activity being delivered by a UK training provider in Rome they can receive the CPD certificate of attendance and use it in their CME record for their Italian professional body or regulator. This is also the case for Italian providers who have been accredited for CPD provision - they can issue CPD certificates that will be delivered for CME purposes.

Overall, it's simple - think of a CPD certificate as a receipt that you would collect to use in your tax record, it is proof that you have attended. It doesn't

matter where you "buy" your training from, or if it uses a different language. For example, in America you would get a "bill" rather than a "receipt" but they are the same thing. All that matters is that you collect up your certificates (or bills, or receipts) and show them to your professional body, or regulator, as proof of you doing your CPD.

Within the domain of Continuing Education, professional continuing education is a specific learning activity generally characterised by the issuance of a certificate or continuing education units (CEU) for the purpose of documenting attendance at a designated seminar or course of instruction.

Licensing bodies in a number of fields (such as teaching) impose continuing education requirements on members who hold licenses to practice within a particular profession. These requirements are intended to encourage professionals to expand their foundations of knowledge and stay up-to-date on new developments.

Depending on the field, these requirements may be satisfied through college or university coursework, extension courses or conferences and seminars attendance. Although individual professions may have different standards, the most widely accepted standard, developed by the International Association for Continuing Education & Training, is that ten contact hours equals one Continuing Education Unit. Not all professionals use the CEU convention.

For example, the American Psychological Association accredits sponsors of continuing education such as PsychContinuingEd.com and uses simply a CE approach. In contrast to the CEU, the CE credit is typically one CE credit for each hour of contact.
